

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Questa Education Foundation provides forgivable loans and generous scholarships to help residents of northeast Indiana achieve education beyond high school. As a Questa Scholar, students receive up to \$20,000 over four years as a forgivable loan to support educational expenses. Scholars can earn between 50-100 percent debt forgiveness when they graduate and return to Northeast Indiana to live and work.

Traditional and Contemporary Scholars receive 50% debt forgiveness when they live and work in Northeast Indiana for five years after graduation. Scholars receive an additional 25% forgiveness (total of 75% forgiven) if they attend and graduate from a partner school.

 Carter Scholars programs: Career Scholars can receive college funding and a full-time job opportunity after graduation. Students in specific academic programs can receive between \$5,000-10,000 in loan funding that is 100% forgiven when the scholar graduates and works at the partnering employer.

Scholarships: Questa awards multiple scholarships to students within Questa Scholar programs and students can apply for unique scholarships through our website. Scholarship opportunities include funding for nursing students and residents pursuing the skilled trades.

Questa is honored to support over 400 local students each year and connect graduates with career opportunities to help Northeast Indiana thrive.

Get to Know Questa Education Foundation

The mission of Questa Education Foundation is to help individuals access postsecondary education, graduate with less debt, and become contributing members of Northeast Indiana's workforce.

Questa offers several funding opportunities for students:

 Traditional Scholars program: Graduating high school seniors and first year college students can receive up to \$5,000 a year for four years (total of \$20,000). Applications are open December 1 – March

 Contemporary Scholars program: Current college students, returning students, and addit learners can receive up to \$5,000 a year for the duration of their academic programs. Applications are open

85 years of Making College Preams Possible

Questa Education Foundation started 85 years ago when R. Nelson Snider saw a trend among his students.

Snider was the principal of South Side High School at the time. "As principal, he would meet every high school senior to talk about their plans for after graduation," said Elizabeth Bushnell, Questa's executive director. "He was concerned that he met so many students who had interest and ability to go to college but didn't have the money to do it."

The country was still in the grip of the Great Depression and only 15 percent of high school graduates went to college.

But Snider was a dedicated educator. When he saw an obstacle for his students, he figured out a way to remove it. Snider started a college loan fund that he ran out of his office.

"He called it the South Side Loan Fund," Bushnell said. "He personally contributed money and he raised money from educators and businesspeople in the community."

In 1946, the fund incorporated as a nonprofit called the Fort Wayne Educational Foundation. Over the years, the program grew to serve students throughout the 11-county region of northeast Indiana. In 2007, the name was changed to the Questa Education Foundation and a new feature was added: Forgiveness of 50 percent of the loan if the student remained in northeast Indiana for five years after graduation.

The forgivable component of the loan program was added to address

brain drain concerns that were being expressed in Fort Wayne in the middle of the last decade.




"There was so much conversation in our community at the time about brain drain and how we were losing college graduates from the region, leaving a significant talent gap," Bushnell said.

Questa's board spent a year researching college aid programs.

"They created something unique, but also kind of risky," Bushnell said. "Up until that point, the loans we provided were fully repaid. The board knew they were creating a perpetual fundraising need by adding the forgiveness component, but they wanted to make a positive impact on talent retention in the region. They didn't know if it was going to work, but they were willing to take the risk to see if it would be a success. And, fortunately, it was."





Bushnell said Questa is retaining graduates at record rates.

"Since launching the forgivable loan program 15 years ago, nearly 75 percent of Questa graduates return to the region to live and work," she said.

Questa now partners with local employers to continue building the workforce needed for economic success. Through the Career Scholars program, local employers help fund students in fields where they want to hire graduates.

"I call it a triple win," said Mark Levy, a former director of Questa. "Students get the funding they need for education, employers get the talent they need, and our community gets engaged, productive citizens." A lot has changed since Snider first started the South Side Loan Fund, Bushnell said, but some things haven't.

"I think the motivation is the same as it was in 1937," she said. "There are a lot of students with a financial need that puts college out of their reach. The core of Questa programs is making those college dreams possible for students."

Another thing that has stayed consistent since the beginning, Bushnell said, is community investment in the program.

"It's a local program," she said. "It's entirely unique to our region. Questa doesn't exist anywhere else, and our community makes it possible. Every dollar we raise is from our local community to invest in our local students."



running college loan program to create the "half-back loan program" designed to bring college graduates back to the region. Local students who receive college funding through Questa earn 50% forgiveness on their Questa loan when they return to northeast Indiana to live and work after graduation. With Dr. Crawford's leadership, the City of Fort Wayne and Questa Education Foundation joined forces to combat brain drain.

Dr. Crawford championed ongoing support for local students and retention of graduates in the region. Crawford donated his entire city council salary to Questa and continued annual contributions after he left City Council, personally supporting dozens of local students through Questa programs.

During his tenure on City Council, Crawford also championed support for Questa through the Legacy Fund, providing Questa loans to hundreds of Fort Wayne students with little access to college without help from the program.

The cumulative impact of Crawford's efforts directly supported over 200 local

students, with nearly 75% of graduates remaining in the region to build our workforce and our community.

While just one of Dr. Crawford's notable accomplishments, his leadership and dedication to Fort Wayne students leaves a legacy that will benefit our region for decades to come.

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"Partnerships are the path to success," according to Elizabeth Bushnell, executive director of Questa Education Foundation.

"There are so many good organizations doing fantastic work in our region. The more we can align to work together, the








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between Questa and Stillwater Hospice.

Stillwater partners with Questa to support current Stillwater employees with the funds they need to further their education.

Leslie Friedel, CEO at Stillwater Hospice, said the process of collaborating with Questa started in 2019 and the first money was awarded to a student in 2020.

Stillwater provides the funding, she said, and Questa manages the program. Questa staff maintain relationships with students throughout their educational journeys. They onboard students, support students' academic progress, and collaborate with the Stillwater team to promote student success.

Stillwater has helped fund the continuing education of five employees so far, Friedel said.

The educational aims of these employees are diverse. Several students are LPNs studying to become RNs and one woman is going for her MBA.

One thing all employees at Stillwater have in common, reaardless of position at the company or plans to advance, is a certain disposition.

"One of our biggest success stories," Friedel said, "is that we hire a very compassionate, unique type of individual that has the heart for the type of work we do."

Stillwater considers helping their employees to grow as an honor and a privilege, Friedel said.

"If they are interested in growing their skill set in their career with us." she said, "we are more than happy to support them."



Questa Makes College Goals Possible

Grace Buhr grew up wanting to attend Indiana University.

"My family has a rich history with IU," she said. "I grew up with my dad screaming at the television from November to March because of IU basketball."

Now, she is a senior at IU studying operations management and business analytics. She said she couldn't have done it without Questa.

"Questa haz allowed me to come to IU."



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Buhr learned about Questa from her older sister, who also attended IU with Questa's help. "She loved her IU experience,' Buhr said, "So, I knew that I would. Tuition here...it's not cheap. So Questa has allowed me to come to IU."

Burh said her senior year is even more bittersweet than it might normally be because of COVID. COVID took some of the life out of campus life thanks to remote learning, public strictures and cancelled and curtailed events.

"Socially, I am sad this is my last year," she said. "This year is the most normal year since freshman year. It is crazy how COVID dictated my college experience."

Wayne and work for five years so that she can get half of her Questa loan forgiven. She isn't sure what she will do after that, but there's a good chance that she will remain in Fort Wayne longer.

"I have family in Fort Wayne," she said. "It's really exciting to see what's been happening in Fort Wayne: everything that's been going on downtown and over at Electric Works. There's good industry in Fort Wayne. But five years ago, my life was so much different than it is now. It could be

completely different after the next five years."

Despite some of the challenges she faced at IU, Buhr said she wouldn't change a thing about her time there.

"I don't think I would ever trade this experience for the world," she said. "I have loved my time here. I'm really grateful. And if it hadn't been for Questa, I might not have even come here.'



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Questa Alumna Propels Community Development in Southeast Fort Wayne

Near Southtown Crossing, a complex is rising. When it is completed, it will consist of five buildings. One building will house LegacyOne Real Estate & Contracting Inc., and the others will provide space for entrepreneurs who might not be able

to afford to set up shop in other parts of the city.

Linda Golden, the co-owner of LegacyOne, envisions a vibrant commercial future for that area.

Golden has spent much of her adult life helping underserved

communities and people on the margins in Fort Wayne. She grew up on the southeast side of town and has always been devoted to that region.

Before she founded Legacy One, she ran a nonprofit called Genesis Outreach that provided several levels of assistance to homeless people.

A few years back, she decided to return to Ivy Tech and earn her business degree after a 25-year hiatus necessitated by child-raising. She accomplished that feat (the business dearee not the child-raising) with the help of Questa.

"I think mine was the returning student program," she said. "That's the one that I applied for. At the time, I was just coming out of the nonprofit. I did not have a retirement package or anything so it really helped me financially, just with everyday living, to be able to go back to school comfortably."

Being a sexegenarian undergraduate presents unique challenges, but Golden said she loved it.



"I've always loved learning," she said. "I love being on campus. I love being around younger students. I love being in class. It was different. But it was a good difference."

Golden's mindset was different than it had been when she was a younger student. "The discipline to study," she said. "The discipline to go to class. I was just so much more mature about those things than I had been when I was younger."

While Golden was attending college, she had one grandchild at Trine and one at Ivy Tech. She also had two sisters who were taking continuing education classes at Ivy Tech. "One is a nurse and one is a retired teacher," she

said, referring to her sisters. "But they just wanted to take some additional classes in whatever interested them. So we were all at the school at the same time." The assistance Golden got from Questa not only lessened her stress during school, it lessened it after she'd earned her degree.

"There was never any thought of me leaving the city for work, of course," Golden said. "But being able to get that forgivable part of the loan really made it a lot easier to pay back."

Golden founded LegacyOne with a goal of increasing black home ownership and black wealth in Fort Wayne. "I look at a home as a piggy bank." she said.

Golden hopes that her Southtown complex will inspire others to establish businesses in that part of town.

"Ours is not the only one going up," she said. "There's actually three, including ours three new construction projects going up. I believe there will be more."
